


Can't Pass It On: For the public

- Terrence Higgins Trust launched the Can't Pass It On Campaign in summer 2017.
- It had extensive community reach with out of home advertising, social media promotion and promotion at various Pride celebrations around the country.
- General public knowledge surveys: one in ten people knew or believed the Can't Pass it On fact (2017). Latest survey showed a rise to nearly one in three (2021).
- Can't Pass It On has continued to be a highly recognised brand and public-friendly iteration of the U=U message.



 With people living with HIV reporting they are most likely to experience HIV-related stigma from healthcare professionals, something more focused was needed.







Can't Pass It On: Research

Positive perspectives 2 study(2020)

- 34% (n=801) PLWHIV had not been told about the U=U message by their healthcare professionals
- The 66% (n=1,588) who had been told, were more likely to believe that effective treatment prevents transmission, report treatment satisfaction, have an undetectable viral load and report better general, mental and sexual health.

British HIV Association member survey (2018)

Only 37% healthcare professionals told PLWHIV that transmission risk was zero.

Terrence Higgins Trust survey (2019)

Just 39% PLWHIV stated their healthcare professional told them the U=U message.





"I think it should have been explained to me when I was diagnosed i.e. that with treatment I would become undetectable and what that means. Not knowing probably contributed to my own self stigma and my confidence about sharing my status with others. I think this also probably contributed to feelings of isolation."

"I wish I had known sooner. I'd have liked to have known that I wasn't a risk to my husband, and haven't been for ten years.

Reading about it in my clinic waiting room was quite a public way to find that out!"


The learnings from this research was the rationale for the development of an online training resource for healthcare professionals, by healthcare professionals.





Can't Pass it On Training for healthcare professionals

- Comprehensive, first of it's kind e-learning training programme for healthcare professionals.
- Seeks to increase their knowledge of and confidence in sharing the "Can't Pass It On/ U=U" message.
- Developed by leading experts including HIV and Sexual Health clinicians, primary care doctors, researchers, activists and people living with HIV who coproduced the training programme.



From WAD 2021 to now, the resource has had 4,603 unique page views and 225 quizzes have been completed

- Why U=U is important.
- The evidence supporting the U=U message.
- Talking to patients about U=U.
- Dealing with difficult questions.
- Discussing U=U in primary care.

Key messages from videos

In a survey we conducted in November/December 2019, only 1% had heard about U=U or Can't Pass It On from their GP, which is something that must be improved.

Knowing about U=U can have a profound impact on people fiving with HIV.

Discussing this with your patients shows you are up to date with your knowledge and concerned about their welfare.



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It also includes:

- Quizzes to test people's knowledge at the end of key sections on the resource.
- Training resources including downloadable PowerPoint presentations, case studies and frequently asked questions
- Patient resources including downloadable posters and leaflets as well as PowerPoint slides (for reception area screens),
- More on the background research behind U=U.
- Downloadable continuous professional development (CPD) log for healthcare professionals to use as evidence of informal CPD hours

Launch

- A stand at the Primary Care and Public Health conference
- Two webinars one with HIV Prevention England and the other with Royal College of General Practitioners that promoted it to their 54,000 members
- Currently applying for accreditation by Royal College of General practitioners
- Promotion through multiple channels, including a Gilead email campaign which resulted in 369 click-throughs from healthcare professionals.
- To date the resource has had over 4,603 unique page views and more than 225 quizzes completed

- The project faced many challenges as a result of Covid and the availability of contributors resulting on it being delayed a number of times. However that gave the opportunity to incorporate the latest evidence and ensure it is up to date.
- It was essential to partner with leading healthcare institutions such as the Royal College of General Practitioners (RCGP) to promote it and build engagement with healthcare professionals.
